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## Reading work here

### In the Gatehouse

Soldiers guarded the entrance to the Lord's castle. It was called the gatehouse. They looked out for visitors, and stopped enemies from coming into the castle.



### The Great Hall

The Lord met visitors in the Great Hall. **Feasts** were held there, musicians and jugglers performed for the visitors.



### In the Kitchen

The workers in the castle kitchen were usually men, except for the ale-wife who made the beer.

The cooks and bakers made the food while the **scullions** did the cleaning.

The spit-boy's job was to turn the meat as it cooked over the fire.

### The Castle Walls

The soldiers lived in the castle.

They **defended** the castle walls from their **enemies**.

If they had time, they pulled up the drawbridge and let down the **portcullis** to keep attackers out.

They shot arrows and threw rocks at attackers.

### Water and Waste

The water keeper looked after the Lord's rivers and ponds. The castle toilets emptied into a pit. People used a handful of hay instead of toilet paper.

### The Chapel

Every castle had a chapel. A **priest** worked there. He said prayers every day with the Lord and his family.

Others made medicines from herbs for people who were ill.

Priests made sure that everyone kept the church rules, such as eating fish on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays.

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#### Glossary

**defended** - resist an attack made on (someone or something)

**enemies** - a person who is actively opposed or hostile to someone or something.

**feast** - a large meal

**portcullis** - a strong, heavy grating that can be lowered down a gateway to block it.

**priest** - a minister of Catholic, Orthodox, or Anglican Church

**scullion** - a servant assigned the dull kitchen tasks.

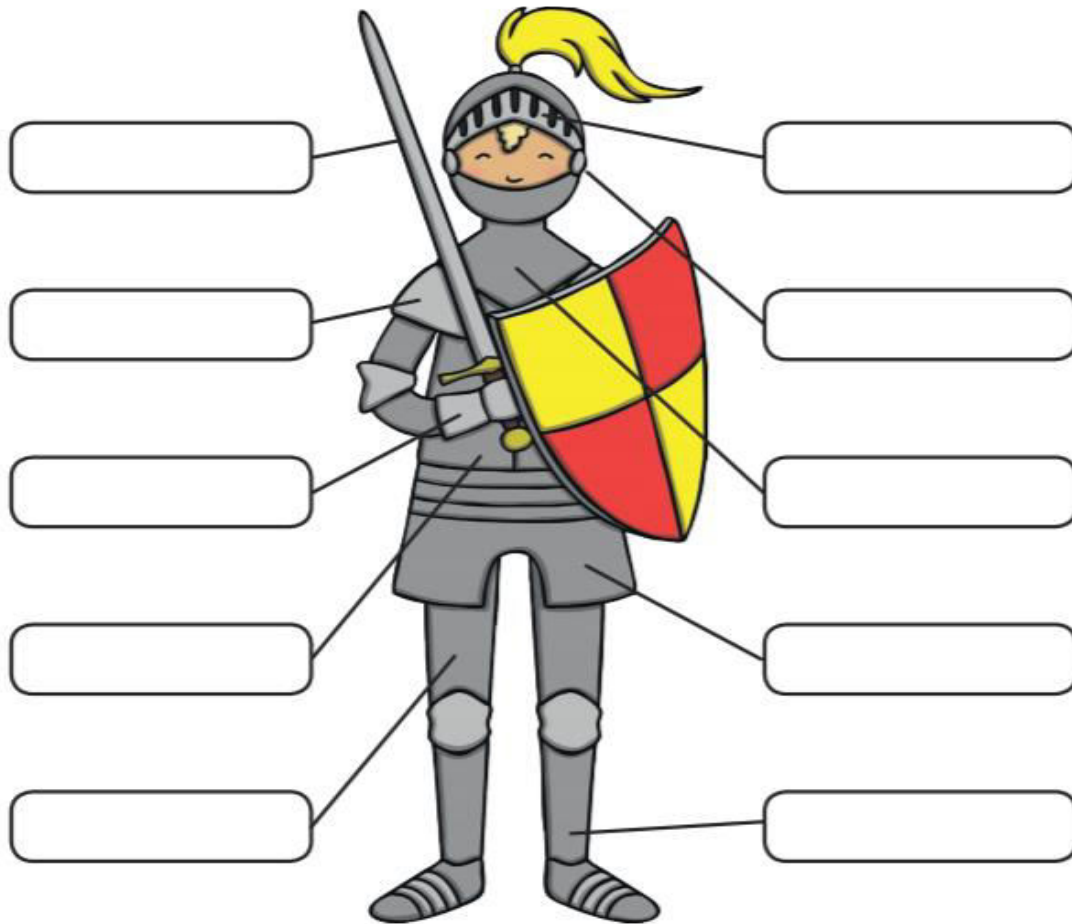
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# Label the Knight's Armour
