Becoming a knight

Becoming a knight was a long and difficult process and only the sons of Nobles could become Medieval Knights. Training to be a medieval knight started at a very early age around seven years of age boys would become a page.


Page

A boy started his knighthood training at the age of 7 or 8. They were sent to a Lord's castle to be trained for knighthood. The young trainee was known as a page. During his time as a page, he learned about horses, armour and weapons. He also learnt to play chess to learn strategies which would be useful for battle as a knight.

Hunting was important, so a page had to handle hawks and falcons. A page was also expected to serve meals at the knights table, they had to learn how to carve the meat properly before becoming a knight.

Pages also practiced fighting with a sword against a wooden pole to develop strong muscles, which are needed when you become a knight. Pages also had to learn to shoot a bow and arrow for hunting and practiced this on a daily basis.

One of the most important lessons a page learnt was how to be courteous (have manners and be polite). The lady of the castle taught the page manners. He would also learn to dance and sing from the lady.



Squire

When the page turned 14 years old the page becomes a squire. Squires had to follow their master on the battlefield to protect him if he would fall.



A squire was also responsible for dressing knights for battles and tournaments. He was the knight's assistant and the only one allowed to help the knight. The squire was responsible for taking care of the knight's armour and weapons. He had to become skilled in the use of armour as well as the weapons. A squire had to get used to wearing the armour.



Knight

A squire generally became a knight between the ages of eighteen and twenty but only when they were considered ready. The knight who trained the squire would dub him a knight. The dub with a tap on each shoulder with a sword and reminded of the rules he promised to hold. If a knight broke these rules, he was stripped of being a knight and was known as dishonourable. This means he wasn't a trustworthy person anymore.



How else could you become a knight?

There were two other ways for a male to become a knight. If there was a battle and the king needed additional men, he would knight several squires to have enough men to fight. Also, someone could become a knight for showing bravery and courage in battle.
