


<p><u>Tuesday 12th May 2020</u></p> <p><u>Home Learning – Year 2 - Week 4 – Monday</u></p>	
<p>Reading</p> 	<p>Today you have both pages of the story 'Sir Charlie Stinky Socks' (pg 3 and pg4). Read this with an adult or sibling and see if your prediction from yesterday was correct? Remember its good to act out the story everyday to bring it to life.</p> <p>Then in your workbook complete the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Make a spider diagram of adjectives you would use to describe Sir Charlie Stinky Socks (see the example on pg 5). - Choose two of these adjectives and write a sentence to say why you chose these.
<p>Writing</p> 	<p>Imagine you are a reporter and you're going to interview the King or Queen of the castle you described from yesterday. What questions would you want to ask them? You need to think about what interesting information you would like to know about their life? Maybe you want to know how they feel about being a royal? Or what duties would they have to carry out? Write five questions you would like to ask them. I have written some examples on page 6.</p>

"Then why are you crying princess?" asked Sir Charlie.



Reading example answer

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Brave



adventurous

I chose the adjective **adventurous** because in the story it says that Charlie wanted to go on a big adventure in the forest. Also, Charlie didn't know what was in the forest or the tower, but he wanted to go and discover it for himself.

Remember:

An **adjective** is a word that describes a noun (person, place or thing). It is often known as a describing word. E.g.

Blue skies

purple coat.

Brave soldier

Fluffy clouds

The adjective can come after the noun e.g.

The tall man

The man is crazy

The sky is blue.
