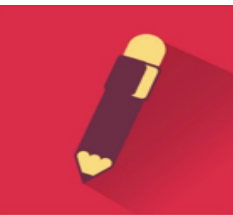

Reading text

Treasure Hunting

In 1873, an archaeologist called Heinrich Schliemann discovered a large collection of gold and other artefacts. He unearthed them in a place where he believed the ancient city of Troy was located. The collection is called Priam's Treasure after a famous king, Priam.

What is in the collection?

There is a shield, a cauldron, a vase, two diadems, rings, buttons, bracelets, goblets, a bottle, gold cups and silver knives.

When would it have been made and used?

2600-2300 BC

Where was it found?

It was found in Hissarlik, which is believed to be Ancient Troy.

There is still some controversy with many archaeologists claiming that this treasure does nothing to prove the existence of Troy.

2. Which two words mean the same as 'found'?

Accept 'discovered' and 'unearthed'



3. How does the layout help the reader?

Accept a reasonable explanation that the bold subheadings make it easier for the reader to find the information they need.



4. Do you think this treasure proves the existence of Troy? Why?

Accept a reasonable explanation, e.g. Yes, because this treasure dates from the time of Ancient Greek history or no, because it just proves there was a settlement there but not necessarily Troy.
